From the very beginning of the Montrose Botanic Gardens, the City of Montrose has been a valued partner – from leasing MBS 3.55 acres south of the Pavilion, to providing water for our plantings, to assorted excavation and other utility services. The MBS Board sends a hearty thanks to the City and its employees for all their support over the years!



This winter, with the start of development of the Veterans Memorial Plaza on City-owned property to our west, the Gardens benefitted again as the City brought an electric line along our western boundary. This represented a significant cost saving for MBS. From there, we were able to install a separate service pedestal to bring power into our metal storage building (BOB). Think of it – lights, outlets to recharge batteries for garden tools, heaters when we need to work in the winter time! Thank you again, City of Montrose!


#### WHERE WOULD WE BE WITHOUT OUR WEED WARRIORS?


#### **BOOK REVIEW: GARDEN ALCHEMY**

In *Garden Alchemy*, author Stephanie Rose synthesizes her principles of organic gardening as a creative and therapeutic outlet into an easy to digest guide. Somehow, she accomplishes this being both scientific and artistic!

Part recipe book and part reference manual, this short tome covers simple "at-home" soil testing as well as guidelines for custom amendments, mulches, composts, and fertilizers to improve the performance of your soil. Rose also tackles numerous strategies to persuade beneficial critters (birds and bees and insects) into making your garden their home.

In the author's hands, gardening becomes a creative venture. From heart-shaped seed bombs (Mother's Day or teacher's gift, anyone?) to seed starters, bird feeders, and citronella candles, Rose illustrates just enough of her ideas to ready you to create your own. *Garden Alchemy* is not a definitive resource on organic gardening, but it is a great stepping stone for anyone needing encouragement or ideas about how to make their outdoor space more nurturing.



## MEMBER IN THE SPOTLIGHT: LINDA CORWINE MCINTOSH by Liz Mauch, MBS President

I had a most delightful time interviewing Linda, who recently retired from her Montrose Landscape Consulting and Spraying business. (Congratulations, Linda!) Linda has a lifetime love of gardening, starting at her childhood home in Colorado Springs. After college, she worked in a greenhouse in her hometown, then moved to Montrose in 1975 and worked at the Johnson Greenhouse on west Main St (long gone). They grew poinsettias, and started annuals and vegetables from seed. After her two girls were born, she worked at Four Seasons Nursery (later sold to Sheree Wanner and renamed Camelot Gardens).

Linda gives much credit to Tri-River CSU Horticulture Agent Dr. Curtis Swift for his Master Gardener and Advanced Master Gardener training, along with his friendship and mentoring. With her Master Gardener training as a foundation, she eventually took the exams to become an ISA Certified Arborist and also obtained her Commercial Pesticide Applicator license. Throughout her career, she has especially enjoyed figuring out what is causing problems with a plant or tree.

Linda has given, and continues to give, so much to our community: She is Superintendent of Floriculture and Crops for the Montrose County Fair. She has written timely gardening articles for the *Montrose Daily Press* since 1995. She was named "Colorado Master Gardener of the Year" in 1996, and currently serves on the Tri-River Area Master Gardener's Advisory Board, and has served on the Montrose County and Ouray County Weed Boards. For many years, Linda has inspected and treated the trees as needed in the Botanic Gardens. We appreciate you, Linda!



Linda was one of the Montrose Botanic Garden's founders, and was our fourth President. The southwest area was full of Russian Knapweed, and they got it under control. Most of what was planted or achieved in the early years came through donated materials and labor. During her term as President, she wrote several grants and received grant awards to enable construction of the Valley Garden.

In her spare time, Linda enjoys.....GARDENING! -- especially growing vegetables, and canning/freezing /dehydrating them. Living out of town in the country, she has been experimenting with and learning about plants that are deer resistant and drought tolerant.

Shift in plans from a Meditation Garden to a Xeric Garden (now called the Waterwise Garden) as a result of chronic drought.





#### BEEKEEPING ALONGSIDE NATIVE POLLINATORS

with Steve Manis and Gayle Johnson

Keeping bees can be an amazing experience – enlightening, humbling, educational and rewarding. There is nothing like looking into a hive and seeing thousands of bees, pounds of honey and honeycomb cells full of pollen. Unfortunately, there is also nothing more humbling than looking into a hive and seeing nothing except dead bees when you have no idea what went wrong.

Beekeeping is a study of a biome -- trying to understand the relationship between flowers, pollen, native pollinators and honey bees, which are non-natives. The majority of food crops rely on pollination by some species of bee so maintaining a healthy pollinator population is vitally important.

Gayle Johnson and her brother Steve Manis have been keeping bees west of Montrose for about 10 years. They maintain about 35 hives at three different locations and collect 30 to 50 gallons of honey every year.

Gayle and Steve try to balance good plant pollination without jeopardizing the native pollinators. They try to keep the number of non-native honey bees low to prevent overwhelming the native pollinators. They understand the need for pesticides but try to avoid putting a large number of bees near crops that require extensive insecticide applications.



Gayle and Steve's commitment to learning and sharing that knowledge is evident as they support both novice and experienced beekeepers. They also actively participate in meetings to stay informed about the latest advancements in bee health and disease management. Through their efforts, Gayle and Steve embody the principles of responsible beekeeping, promoting both honey production and the conservation of pollinator diversity.

Join us for Steve and Gayle's presentation on beekeeping on Saturday, April 12 at 10:30 am in the Montrose Library Community Room.


## BOOK REVIEW: DURABLE PLANTS by Tracy Harrison, At-Large Board Member
